Thank you for your interest in writing for TheOrganicPrepper.com, one of the most popular emergency preparedness websites in the United States. Here are our writer's guidelines.

Payment. Payment will be discussed individually. You will be paid via PayPal upon our acceptance of the article you've submitted. PayPal is our only method of payment.

Your article cannot have been previously published. It's okay if you have something posted someplace that is a jumping off point for your piece, but it cannot have been published before in its entirety. AFTER we post your article, we have a Creative Commons Copyright which means you can post it at your own website with a link back to OP, leaving all links intact.

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You can have links in your bio. If you have any products and/or your own website, feel free to include these in your bio. We want to help promote you!

We reserve the right to add links to your articles. We may add backlinks to related content on OP or external links to a related article or product.

Don't worry if you feel like you're "not a writer." Most people aren't great writers unless they have great editors. We have great editors and will present your article very professionally.

We need to know where all pictures included in your article come from. We don't want to get sued for using someone's photos without permission. If you include any photos in your article, please let us know the source of each.

We prefer Word document submissions. Google documents and PDFs don't transfer over well at all. (Also, we can't copy pictures from Google Docs) If you do not have Word, an article in the body of an email is preferable.

We may have questions. Part of the editing process is making sure everything is clear and well organized. We may have questions about your article and would appreciate a response as soon as you can.

Articles must be a minimum of 800 words. We don't have a maximum but if you're getting much past 4K, you should probably break things up into a series.

Stick to your topic. It's very important to stick to your topic in an article. It's welcome to add a little personal color with stories but don't get too far off track. We find that an outline can help if you are prone to rambling. Sometimes we end up breaking one article into two because there are really two topics.
